It has the latest information to help people better understand breast cancer risk factors, screening, diagnosis, treatment, metastatic breast cancer, survivorship and more. Information is presented through the breast cancer continuum of care, including breast anatomy, risk factors, screening and diagnostic tests, treatment options, survivorship topics, complementary and integrative therapies and support. The ABC content was co-developed by Harvard Medical School faculty and Dana-Farber Cancer Institute staff.
